Summary

1. Now we basically do three to four cases per month.
2. Priorities can be given to those who have their acquaintances with our doctors or director.
3. Investigator: Need to pay some extra money?
Pei Xiangke: Ah, yes, that's the only way.
4. You must prepare the money for the expenses.
5. Investigator: The cost for the surgery alone?
Pei Xiangke: Approximately over 300,000 yuan.

Translation

Pei Xiangke: Hello?

Investigator: Hello, is this No. 281 Hospital of Beijing Military Region? Is Dr. Pei of the Urology Center available? Pei Xiangke?

Pei Xiangke: Ah, who is this?

Investigator: Oh, this is Ms. Zhao. I'm from Shenyang, Liaoning. I have a relative who would like to have a kidney transplant. He'd like to go to your hospital (for his surgery), so I'm wondering if he is to do so, how long it would take...

Pei Xiangke: How did you find me?

Investigator: Oh, I found you on the Internet. I searched a lot of hospitals online, and called them all one by one, to see which one does...

Pei Xiangke: You can get it (the transplant) done in Shenyang as well, right?

Investigator: He works in Beijing, so he'd like to find someplace near him.

Pei Xiangke: Oh. He works in Beijing.

Investigator: Yes, yes, that's right. But I'm in Shenyang.

Pei Xiangke: What does he do?

Investigator: I am in Shenyang, and he is doing his trading business there (in Beijing).

Pei Xiangke: Why wouldn't he consider getting it(his transplant) done in Beijing?
There're so many hospitals in Beijing, aren't there?

Investigator: He has been doing his business in Beijing. So I have been helping him search hospitals online, and all other relatives have been doing the same. We'd like to pick whichever hospital offers the shortest wait time. That's the situation.

Pei Xiangke: Okay.

Investigator: Yeah, so we did our research, and our friends also recommended your hospital, saying that there's a doctor there named Pei Xiangke, who does a good job with excellent skills. Could he do it (for us)? How much would it cost? These are the kind of questions we'd like to ask.

Pei Xiangke: Oh, every patient has to wait for his/her kidney source. You may first bring over his tissue typing report to my laboratory to get him on the waiting list. We'll then inform you once a suitable kidney donor becomes available.

Investigator: Ah, all his medical tests are finished, except for his tissue typing, which is yet to be done. Now we've been waiting, waiting in the queue at those hospitals we visited, and making appointments from online as well—we've made a lot of preparations. Anyways, we've been helping him inquire about a few hospitals. For example, at your hospital, how long would be the wait? Would it be one week, two weeks, one month, or two months? Approximately how long? And his tissue typing needs to be...

Pei Xiangke: Now it goes like this. Basically, we do three to four cases per month...on average...at present.

Investigator: Okay.

Pei Xiangke: (We) don't do many cases, however, it's really hard to tell when a kidney donor would become available (for him). Because of his...what's his blood type?

Investigator: His blood type is B.

Pei Xiangke: Type B has a slightly better chance. The key is...you have to get his blood type...not blood type...it's that chip that must be brought over here first.

Investigator: Okay.

Pei Xiangke: We cannot do it for you without that (the chip). Because whether or not his tissue typing can be successfully carried out...it won't work if the tissue typing fails.

Investigator: Okay, okay, alright.

Pei Xiangke: So, how's the condition of the patient himself? It would be better to let his doctor do an assessment on him, in order to see if he's relatively weak somewhere in his body, or if he seems strong enough to undergo kidney transplantation but still has parts of his body unfit for the surgery. We'll have to take a look at all these (details).

Investigator: Oh, oh, okay, okay, that's fine. Well, if you can do three or four cases at your hospital, you're technically sound. So, I just would like to ask about the wait time: If his tissue typing and everything else are okay and we decide to proceed, how long would we have to wait? One week?

Pei Xiangke: Oh... if you are to come here, that (one week) may not be possible, because we have a lot of patients on our waiting list, especially since you're from elsewhere. You may not necessarily get picked preferentially, even under the same circumstances as the locals.

Investigator: Do the locals get picked first?

Pei Xiangke: That's for sure!

Investigator: Ah...ah...ah...Is that so? If we get into the queue as non-locals, how long would we have to wait? Would it take one or two months before we could have a chance?

Pei Xiangke: Oh...no! That would be very difficult.

Investigator: Ah, really? It would be so difficult.

Pei Xiangke: Well, unless... you have your acquaintance with our doctor(s) or director. In such a case, we could choose you first, and that would work.

Investigator: Well, how about if we pay a bit more money?

Pei Xiangke: Ah, yes, yes, that's the only way.

Investigator: Oh, oh.

Pei Xiangke: With so many local patients, we must give priorities to them?

Investigator: Ah, I understand. So, is it still possible to make it work through the connections?

Pei Xiangke: You may not need to do so. Let's just say that under the same conditions, of course, priorities may be given to those acquaintances, or those who truly meet the requirements on a first come first served basis.

Investigator: Oh, okay, I see. So, you're Dr. Pei Xiangke, aren't you?

Pei Xiangke: Yes, I'm.

Investigator: Great, that's great!

Pei Xiangke: Another thing is on the part of you yourself...while at home, you must prepare the money for all the expenses. In addition, you must come over ASAP upon a short notice. Any excuses, such as being busy with work, being somewhere else or too far away to make it to the hospital in time—all these excuses will not work.

Investigator: That's no problem. We will be fully prepared. How much would be the cost approximately? What about the surgery cost alone?

Pei Xiangke: The cost probably would be over 300,000 yuan.

Investigator: It's over 300,000 yuan or so. Okay, that sounds pretty good. Okay, alright, I'll get back to you asking for your help then.

Pei Xiangke: Bye!

Investigator: Okay, thank you! Bye!
