WOIPFG's Investigative Report on the Alleged Organ Harvesting of Living Falun Gong Practitioners at Beijing Friendship Hospital and Its Staff Members Suspected of Participation

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Summary

1. Last year, more than 300 cases of liver transplantation were performed, and many more are performed today.
2. Liver transplants are done, but mainly for children.
3. The liver source is generally the kind of neurology, neurosurgery, cerebral hemorrhage patients.
4. Professor Zhu is still working.

Phone conversation

Investigator: Hello, how are you. Is this the Beijing Friendship Hospital?

Doctor: Yes.

Investigator: Oh, I have a leader who wants to do a liver transplant. Is there a lot of people waiting here? Will it be done soon after going to there?

Doctor: Well, we have a doctor who is responsible for this liver source and this appointment. He is not here now. You can call him after a while and ask him again.

Investigator: Oh, you said he wasn't here these days, right?

Doctor: Yes, the doctor who is in charge of this is not here.

Investigator: Oh, that is, now you said we started doing it this year, was it started in 2018? In 2018 has it started?

Doctor: Ah started.

Investigator: Started right? (Doctor: Yes) Why the leader like to go to this hospital? Because you do a lot and you have a professor Zhu that does well. Does professor Zhu still do surgeries?

Doctor: Oh, does.

Investigator: Still do it, just say that you can ask him to do it, and the leader can ask him to do it?

Doctor: Ah.

Investigator: Oh, that is, do we do more in hospitals now? Because when I called last year, that's because I also know some doctors here, that is, when I called last year, you said you had done about 300 cases last year, right?

Doctor, En, yes.

Investigator: More than 300?

Doctor: How about, you can leave me a phone number, and when the doctor in charge of the appointment comes back, I will tell him.



Investigator: Are you doctor Liu?

Doctor: Er, I'm not doctor Liu, doctor Liu is not here at the moment.

Investigator: Is Doctor Liu in charge of this matter, right?

Doctor: Yes, yes, yes.

Investigator: You said that he is not here, right? Dr. Liu is not here?

Doctor: Right, now here now.

Investigator: I want to ask you doctor, about that is, whether our hospital can do this kind of liver transplantation like a living donor, that is, a living donor liver transplant.

Doctor: live liver transplantation? You said that the source of liver is obtained from a living body?

Investigator: Er, right, right, right. Is there living donor liver transplantation? That is, for example, someone donates or he can donate half of his liver to another recipient.

Doctor: We generally do living-donor liver transplantation for children.

Investigator: Oh, children, no adults?

Doctor: Because children don't need much big size of livers, adults usually use the corpse livers.

Investigator: Oh, adults don't do this, they usually do it for children?

Doctor: Yes.

Investigator: Oh, that's what you said is that, cut half or part of his parents' liver and give it to the child, right?

Doctor: Yes, yes, yes.

Investigator: Oh, oh, it's like this, so this is also called living donor liver transplantation, right? It's like cutting it in half, right?

Doctor: Yes, that's right.

Investigator: Oh, oh, our technique is okay? The techniques of our hospital.

Doctor: Oh yes, it is a relatively conventional technique in the world now.

Investigator: Oh oh oh, I see, that's fine. That is, how many people are queuing up in January this year? Is there a lot of patients waiting?

Doctor: Well, it's hard to say, whether we need to line up or not depends on the organ distribution side mainly.

Investigator: Oh oh oh, then you said that our hospital can do more than 300. Where do these organs usually come from? Are these donors healthy?

Doctor: Well, generally, anyway, I heard that it is generally that, like some neurology and neurosurgery patients with cerebral hemorrhage, relatively speaking, they are not very old. Generally speaking, the liver is still well enough.

Investigator: Then you said that they were all older, and you said that they came from the neurology department?

Doctor: I said that the age will not be particularly old, and they are usually patients with central nervous system diseases, and then died because of this central nervous system disease.



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Investigator: You mean corpse liver? I didn't understand what dead liver meant?

Doctor: It is like some patients who died, and if he has the willingness to donate, and if the family members have the willingness to donate, after his death, his liver will be removed, and then it will be transplanted to a patient stays in our side.

Investigator: Then you say that our hospital, we know that Friendship Hospital does a lot of liver transplants, and we do more than 300 liver transplants. Then other hospitals also do it. Do we have so many donations in Beijing?

Doctor: Well, it is an organ allocation system, and I don't know exactly how it works.

Investigator: Right?

Doctor: Then you can ask Dr. Liu.

Investigator: May I have your last name.

Doctor: Oh my last name is Bu, same as Bu of Budui (force). I'm research student here.

Investigator: Oh, so you participate the surgeries too right?

Doctor: Yes.

Investigator: That is, you said that we made dozens in January this year, now?

Doctor: Hard to say dozens in January, maybe around 20?

Investigator: Oh oh oh, that's appreciated, ok, ok.

Doctor: Sure, no problem.

Investigator: Ok, bye.
